From the Superintendent



As the first nine-week marking period comes to a close, we are provided a wonderful opportunity to reflect on many of the outstanding achievements, events, and positive enhancements that have occurred during recent months.

At Blissfield Community Schools we are proud of the "Commitment to Excellence" that exists throughout our district. Congratulations to the students, staff, and administration at Blissfield Elementary and Middle School for their recognition by the Michigan Department of Education upon receiving EdYES! letter grades of "A" during the 2010-11 school year. This is the fourth consecutive year, and fifth time during the past six school years that Blissfield Elementary has achieved this distinction. Our schools are also proud to be one of just sixty statewide to have received AdvancED District Accreditation.

While students and teachers in grades 3-9 have been actively involved with annual MEAP assessments during the first quarter, many have also enjoyed recent building, technology, and instructional improvements. A variety of projects to reduce energy consumption were completed this past summer including new boiler heating systems at each school, new drop ceilings, duct work and air conditioning units at Blissfield Middle School along with the completion of our new "Project Lead the Way" computer laboratory. At Blissfield High School, each classroom has had new energy efficient windows and unit ventilators installed, while the gymnasium was renovated with new lighting, ceiling tiles, painting and ventilation system. As upper elementary students welcomed the addition of new playground equipment, students throughout the district benefited from the introduction of updated K-5 Social Studies and K-12 Science curriculum materials.

We also wish to acknowledge the dedicated efforts of our fall season athletes, coaches, and marching band members for their outstanding sportsmanship and serving as role models and ambassadors for our school and community. Beginning next fall the Lenawee County Athletic Association (LCAA) will expand to eight schools as we welcome the addition of Columbia Central and Hillsdale to our conference. Congratulations to the Girls Cross Country for their third consecutive county championship and to our Boys Soccer team on winning their first district championship. Special recognition is also extended to the Marching Royals who received Division I and top school ratings throughout their band festival season.

We hope you will plan to attend Parent-Teacher Conferences on Thursday, November 17th. Conferences will be held district-wide from 8:30-11:30am, 1:00-4:00pm, and 5:00-8:00pm. Additional information will be forthcoming during the coming weeks; however, please note there will be no school for students on Thursday, November 17 and Friday, November 18 and also during Thanksgiving Recess, November 24-25.

Kudos to the many students and parents who participated in our second annual "Walk & Roll" to school day, sponsored by our Safe Routes 2 School committee. We also wish to extend our appreciation to the Blissfield Parent-Teacher Organization (PTO) whom generously shared the costs of renovating both elementary playgrounds during the past three years. Lastly, special thanks to our Blissfield Foundation for Educational Excellence (BFEE), who have contributed over \$850,000 to our schools since their inception. This includes nearly \$7,000 in classroom and curricular materials through their fall Mini-Grants program with an additional \$25,000 donated last spring to help address many of our district technology needs. Thank you for your continued support of Blissfield Community Schools.

SENIOR INFORMATION

Senior Exit Interviews—Seniors are receiving information regarding their graduation status, the college application process, scholarship and financial aid details. Job shadowing information was also provided during their exit interview with Mr. Willson. Parents, please ask your senior about their exit interview, and as always, please call the CCC if you need further information at 486-2148 x203.

College Applications—Students are encouraged to apply to college ASAP. All applications to four year schools should be completed no later than December, 2011. Many colleges have an on-line application process that saves time and often is less costly than paper applications.

Docufide—is a resource for students to request transcripts and communicate with the counseling staff regarding information needed for college and scholarship applications. Students who are not registered need to stop in the CCC to find out how.

Scholarships—Information about scholarships for seniors is kept on file in the CCC. Seniors are encouraged to check the file weekly. An electronic file is available on the BHS Website and on Facebook. Three valuable websites for scholarship and school financing are: <http://www.michigan.gov/mistudentaid> (State of Michigan Paying for College webpage), <http://www.lisd.us/Scholarships/index.aspx> (Lenawee County Scholarships), and <http://www.collegeview.com>

Teacher or Counselor Recommendation Letters—If students need recommendations for colleges or scholarships please allow two weeks for administrators or faculty to complete them. Also, when requesting a recommendation, please complete a "Student Biography" form (available in the CCC) as a reference of your academic and extracurricular activities history.

ACT/SAT—Registration packets are available for the ACT and SAT tests. Students who were juniors in the State of Michigan in Spring, 2011 should already have taken the ACT. Students may obtain forms for retaking the test in the CCC. Remember, due to a change in State of Michigan legislation, students are allowed only one free ACT test at Blissfield High School.

Michigan Competitive Scholarship—Eligibility for the Michigan Competitive Scholarship Program is determined in part by the student achieving a qualifying score on the ACT. Therefore it is critical that seniors who have not taken the ACT be advised to do so, no later than the December 10, 2011 test date.

What Do Owls Eat?
