Philosophy and Objectives

"Outdoor education is not a separate discipline like science or math. Rather it is a learning "climate" that offers young people the chance to identify and resolve real-life problems, to acquire skills with which to enjoy a lifetime of creative living, to develop a concern about man and his natural environment, and to get back in touch with those aspects of living where our roots were once firm and deep."

Besides this very appropriate philosophy, we have the following objectives for our program, "Reliving our Roots – an 1800's Experience", all dovetail with our overall curriculum and mission statement.

Historical Appreciation

An objective of this experience is to let the students relive, as much as practical, three days in the early 1800's in order to reinforce the things they learned about early Michigan in history class. In 1837, when Michigan became a state, cooking over open-fires, and canoe transportation, and less than modern conditions were necessities rather than recreation. Students experience these as well as learn about homesteading, surveying and pioneer crafts. All of these activities provide a perfects way to conclude your student's experience at Blissfield Middle School.

Outdoor Appreciation and Skills

Another objective is for students to have a deeper appreciation for their environment and a better knowledge of skills needed in the out-of-doors. Building no-scar fires and proper disposal of garbage are taught, but perhaps the greatest gift we give the students is the opportunity to be outdoors where they may witness Canadian geese and goslings, deer that inhabit the wild areas of camp or even hear the strange thumping or beating of the courting partridge.

Social Skills and Individual Growth

All of our activities promote social and individual growth. We participate in an obstacle/cooperation course that demonstrates the need for working together to complete rather difficult physical challenges. Group cooking, dish washing and other chores build cohesiveness among campers. A square dance and eighth grade celebration are highlights of the final night together. Many individuals find they are able to do things they felt they were unable to do. Quiet moments around campfires give insights about others we have never seen or talked to in the years we have been together.

Program

"Reliving our Roots – an 1800's experience" begins right after getting off the bus. We all have a long hike, carrying everything we take, to three different "communities" or living areas. There the "citizens" are introduced to their "family" for the week. These co-ed groups of six to eight students and adults live and work together for the three days within the three different areas we reside. Cooking, cleaning, an obstacle course and competitions are done together. We soon find out that pulling together makes life much easier. On several occasions, we get the entire group together so students will get to see friends even if separated by communities.

The following is a list of activities planned for the campers. You can see we are very busy and little time is available for idleness.

Town Meetings:

These get-togethers are designed to iron out problems.

Canoe Paddling:

With life jackets a must, and close adult supervision, even non-or poor swimmers can participate.

COPE Low Ropes:

This is an obstacle course designed for group cooperation and development that is climaxed by "The Wall", a real challenge the CAN be met by all if we work together.

Tower Climb:

Climb a 30 foot Tower! You can choose from the easy side, the hard side or the insane difficult side. Then you get to repel back down.

Archery:

Test your skill on a real archery range with certified instructors. Safety is a key!

Mountain Biking:

Take the wildest ride up and down hills. You may even find yourself in a deep mud hole.

Group Campfire:

Here is a chance to hear some of the wildest stories and learn some of the neatest songs going.

Night Hike:

We learn the sounds of the night and the ease of mobility if we become adjusted to the light; perhaps something may "spark" our interests on this dark adventure.

The Great Chili Cook-Off:

Will your family make the best chili? Will you find some "new" secret ingredient that will cause the "impartial" judges to honor you with the championship?

Games Galore:

"Zingers", "Chocolate Factory", volleyball, and softball are among the many competitive activities we participate in.

All will sleep well when we return home!

Housing

College and high-school students will assist Middle School staff as town leaders. Outhouses add that realistic 1800's touch.

Medical Information

Please complete the medical information portion of the registration form which asks you to give any medical conditions or issues we should be aware of as well as parent/guardian insurance information. Please complete the registration form and submit it with the \$125 payment.

Food and Cooking

As mentioned earlier, the students cook as small groups, with Blissfield providing all food. With the help of the cafeteria and bulk buying, we are able to provide good food in ample amounts for low costs. If you have any dietary concerns we should know about, please inform us prior to departure. We may have diabetic and food-allergic campers and fussy eaters come with us and LOVE it. Menus are available upon request.

Clothing and Equipment

Here is a suggested clothing and necessity list. Please note that rain gear is a **must**, as are <u>changes of shoes and socks</u>, as we go rain or shine. Also, note that electronic devices, hair dryers (no electricity) and extra food are not allowed.

Eighth Grade Eligibility

All eighth grade middle school students are eligible and encouraged to participate in our camping experience. Occasionally, a few students inquire about guidelines that could specifically eliminate someone from this unique experience.

The entire teaching staff works very hard to promote the camp as a culmination of three years of middle school life. Activities promote comradeship and a different view of student-teacher relationships. It is for this reason that all students are encouraged to participate.

If students desire to not take part, or show by their behavior that they are not trustworthy, the following system was developed and implemented in the second semester of the eighth grade. The camp staff reserves the right to exclude any student who they feel will be a detriment to the success of camp.

Disqualification System

Students who accumulate four (4) or more disqualification points prior to the date of our experience will be excluded from participating. Listed below is the disqualifying point's scale. Please note that no single incident can disqualify students from enjoying our year-end experience. Other options may be pursued for students who the camp staff and administration feel may be at risk for jeopardizing the success of the camp. Students may not attend camp for more than one year. Listed below is the disqualifying points scale:
