in the books for the 2022-2023 school year. What a difference a year makes! For the first time in a while we have had a normal start to the school year: open buildings, homecoming traditions, awards ceremonies, along with packed gyms and stadiums has been a welcome sight.

The return to normal has also enabled the District to move forward on building key partnerships and implementing new initiatives that will ultimately lead to more opportunities for our BCS students. These partnerships and initiatives support the district goal of being a Destination District.

BCS's partnership with the Village of Blissfield Police Department has enabled the District to employ a full time School Resource Officer (SRO). Officer Luce's first official day was Monday, October 24. We are excited to have Officer Luce in the District and we are looking forward to him establishing positive relationships with all stakeholders. He will be spending his time at all three buildings along with helping out during morning drop off and afternoon dismissal times.

Blissfield High School (BHS) has partnered with Adrian College and Siena Heights for dual enrollment courses and as a result we currently have fifty-seven students enrolled in dual enrollment courses. Dual enrollment courses allow the students the opportunity to earn college credits (for free) while still enrolled in high school. BHS has also partnered with several local businesses for work based learning opportunities and as a result, we have twelve seniors who are taking advantage of this opportunity. Work based learning allows students to earn high school credits while gaining valuable work experience during the school day.

The District has also continued its work, even during the pandemic, on implementing Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS). This program has led to a more positive, productive, and safer environment in all three buildings. PBIS focuses on core values. Each building has implemented PBIS with their own unique acronym to assist in implementing the core values. The elementary utilizes the acronym ROAR: respect, ownership, attitude and resilience. The middle school

It's hard to believe that the first quarter is uses PRIDE: preparation, respect, integrity, determination, and encouragement. The high school uses ROYAL: respect, ownership, your purpose, attitude, and leadership. By having this program in all three buildings, it has led to consistency and continuity throughout the District. It also helps prepare our students for life experiences once they graduate from Blissfield Community Schools.

#### **Inclement Weather and Busing**

If school must be closed or delayed due to inclement weather or other conditions, you will be notified via Infinite Campus instant alert system at your home, work, or cell phone number and email address upon request. To enroll or update your information, contact the office of the school your child attends.

The procedure for calling for a delay or cancellation due to weather related incidences is determined by two administrators. When inclement weather is in the area or predicted, administrators are on the road by 4:30 a.m. checking the various areas of the district. Information is gathered from neighboring districts, the road



commission and Lenawee County Sheriff's department. Determinations on cancellations and delays are made in the best interest of the drivers and students based on, but not limited to factors: including visibility at 1/10 of a mile, 528 feet, snow depth at such an extent to impede the operation of motor vehicles, snow removal progress within the district, icing conditions, flooding conditions, or wind chills with a straight line temperature of less than or equal to minus 25 degrees Fahrenheit.

A decision to delay or cancel school is determined by 6:00 a.m. and announced to all school personnel, students and their



families through Infinite Campus and Infinite ( area radio and television networks. Campus Please tune in to your local TV broadcast or radio station to hear the school closing

updates. Parents and students are urged not to call administration or the bus garage during this time as we are trying to notify staff and make the necessary arrangements.

When a delay is called it is typically for two hours. This means that if your regularly scheduled pickup time for school is 6:45 a.m., then the bus would be at your stop at 8:45 a.m.

Early dismissals from school due to weather conditions are rare. However, they could happen and parents should instruct children about what to do, whom to contact, and/or where to go if school is dismissed early.

#### **Tracking Food Services Balance**

The Infinite Campus student information app provides current balance information for participating families. It is important to track this information regularly. Negative balances can add up quickly.

Applications are available for free and reduced meals. In some situations, families may qualify for free breakfast and lunch every day. Blissfield schools wants every qualifying family to have and use this benefit.

New freezer equipment was installed at the beginning the semester. New meal ideas are being added. In most every respect the school food service year has started very well. Using the Infinite Campus app with the student ID card is absolutely the best way to keep up to date with this important area of the school day.

#### **PBIS Update**

As a refresher, the Blissfield Middle School PBIS expectations are Preparation, Respect, Integrity, Determination, Encouragement. These expectations help our students to know how to act both in the school and beyond. Each class also has specific PRIDE expectations for what these expectations look like in that classroom.

As a school, we look for opportunities to recognize students meeting these expectations, while also using PRIDE to help correct misbehaviors. As part of our PBIS process, teachers and other staff members use evidence-based practices to increase student learning and decrease classroom disruptions. To keep students on the rules in a positive manner, we do the following when teaching academics and behavior:

- \* Constantly teach and refer to our school-wide expectations.
- \* Provide students with more praise than correction.
- \* Talk to students with respect using a positive voice tone.
- \* Actively engage everyone in the class during instruction.
- \* Use pre-correcting, prompting, and redirecting as we teach.
- \* Look for the positive first and provide positive, immediate, frequent, and explicit feedback.

#### Focus on the Foundations

With the implementation of our new ELA programs during the 2021-22 school year, Blissfield has made a commitment to focus on the foundations of literacy. Our goal is for ALL BCS students to become proficient readers and writers, and that starts with a firm foundation.

According to the National Reading Panel Report (2000), the five components of reading include phonemic awareness, phonics, fluency, comprehension, and vocabulary. Our ELA programs address all of these important components as our students build their skills.

Starting in developmental kindergarten and continuing through the end of first grade, phonological and phonemic awareness are addressed through the Heggerty Phonemic Awareness Program. Students are taught to listen for, segment, and blend the individual sounds

in spoken words. This skill, along with more advanced phonemic awareness tasks such as deleting and manipulating phonemes are all done through highly engaging, active word play using Heggerty. Students who can hear the individual sounds and "play" with them, helps them become better readers, writers, and spellers.

Phonics is another piece of the foundational reading skills puzzle. The Fundations Program is a highly effective, multisensory approach to helping students relate the sounds in spoken words to the letters in printed English. In DK, students use the Fundations program to learn the sounds associated with each of the letters in the alphabet and how to form the letters.

In kindergarten, students should be mastering blending the sounds in short words, one syllable words as they master the alphabetic principle. This is truly the foundation of reading.

In first through third grades, the students are taught more sound-spelling correspondences through systematic, explicit approach that includes many hands-on learning activities. In third grade, students learn exceptions to the rules, and take their understanding of the English language and orthography (spelling) even stronger.

In order to ensure our students move past the firm foundation and build their fluency, comprehension, and vocabulary skills, we utilize the knowledgebuilding program, Wit and Wisdom, published by Great Minds in kindergarten through sixth grades. Students dive deep into the core texts and have

many opportunities for reading, writing, listening, speaking, and thinking deeply about a variety of topics while growing their vocabulary and their comprehension skills.

Research shows that background knowledge is the key to strong reading comprehension. Beyond sixth grade, our students build upon this foundation through carefully designed ELA units to become increasingly proficient readers and writers.

Blissfield is fortunate that we have a strong ELA program that addresses all the important aspects of English Language Arts curriculum. Our teachers have been trained to utilize these resources to create the best learning opportunities for all of our students.

### **BCS Provides NWEA Training for Staff**

Blissfield Community Schools has utilized Northwest Evaluation Association (NWEA) Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) test assessments in the fall, winter and spring each year since 2016. Students are assessed in reading and math. The assessment is computer adaptive, meaning the questions students complete are based on their responses to previous questions. With

this data we are able to gain insight about how our students are progressing academically. We are then able to determine which students need extra support, and to which extent they need additional help. To strengthen our interpretation of student data, and implementation into our classrooms, teachers and building administrators went through training this October with presenters from NWEA. Mrs. Francis, Director of Title Programs and Mr. Rupp, Learning Loss Coordinator / Director of Special Education, attended the Michigan Leadership Summit hosted by NWEA to focus on building and district use of student data. #### **Dual Enrollment**

The Michigan State Legislature passed Public Act 160 of 1996, the Postsecondary Enrollment Options Act and Public Act 258 of 2000, the Career and Technical Preparation Act also known as the "Dual Enrollment" bills. These bills modify and expand on provisions of the State School Aid Act providing for students to earn college credit while in high school.

The bills also require that the board of a school district or public school academy ensure that each student in eighth grade or higher be given information about college course taking opportunities. The classes that students are eligible for must not be offered by the high school or academy and must lead towards postsecondary credit, accreditation, certification and/or licensing.


