I'd like to thank all of the first responders and line workers for the countless hours they put in to help everyone get back to a sense of normalcy. The teamwork displayed by everyone is the key to a successful and thriving community.

The school district is an important part of the community. Following the August 2022 Bond Proposal, feedback was obtained through conversations with the community.

The feedback identified a need to revise the proposed scope of work along with reducing the financial impact to the taxpayers. The scope of the updated May 2023 bond is focused around addressing the most critical needs of district facilities.

Due to the size and scale of the school buildings, maintenance, updates, and replacement of facilities is costly and often not possible through the traditional funding received by school districts. Our district has a number of growing needs that require large sums of money to undertake. A bond proposal is the best approach to making the significant necessary updates and improvements needed at BCS.

The scope of the May 2023 bond focuses on three main areas: Safety & Security Improvements, Learning Environment Upgrades, and Energy Efficiency Improvements. The Safety and Security proposed improvements include: new secure entry and office renovations at all educational facilities, fire alarm upgrades at the elementary school, ADA upgrades in all buildings, and ceiling replacements to abate remaining asbestos and repair patches at all educational facilities. Learning environment upgrades include: air conditioning at the high school and elementary school, window replacement and additions at the middle school, STEM lab upgrades at the middle school, renovations to high school band, art and choir rooms, addition of a cafeteria to the elementary school, and educational technology upgrades. Energy efficiency improvements include: replacement of single pane windows at the elementary school, lighting replacements at all buildings, and upgrades to building control systems at the middle school and high school. PROPOSED BOND-FUNDED IMPROVEMENTS

- Window additions to middle school classrooms
- Transformation of middle school locker commons to multipurpose, educational space (lockers would be relocated throughout the building)
- Renovations and additions to high school band, choir, and art classrooms
- Elementary school cafeteria renovation and addition into dedicated gymnasium space
- Other renovation and infrastructure upgrades to provide our students a safe and healthy learning environment



Family Reading Night



Food Services

Infinite Campus keeps students connected with our food service programs through the Parent Portal where it is easy to complete online pre-payments for meals. Staying ahead of these accounts streamlines the flow of students through all of our cafeteria lines. Free and Reduced Meal applications are available through Infinite Campus all year.

Each of our cafeterias have been able to replace or refresh pieces of aging equipment using the combined Free Meal program reimbursements provided by state and federal resources during the pandemic. This has included ovens, warmers, a refrigerator, a stove with more burners and a blender for breakfast smoothies. As a result, our cafeterias are running very well.

Dual Enrollment

The Michigan State Legislature passed Public Act 160 of 1996, the Postsecondary Enrollment Options Act and Public Act 258 of 2000, the Career and Technical Preparation Act also known as the "Dual Enrollment" bills. These bills modify and expand on provisions of the State School Aid Act providing for students to earn college credit while in high school. The bills also require that the board of a school district or public school academy ensure that each student in eighth grade or higher be given information about college course taking opportunities. The classes that students are eligible for must not be offered by the high school or academy and must lead towards postsecondary credit, accreditation, certification and/or licensing. AP Testing begins May 1

AP Advanced Placement Testing will begin for students in AP Chemistry, AP English Literature, and AP World History during the first two full weeks in May. The AP Chemistry test will take place from 12 – 3 pm on May 1st, the AP English Literature test will take place from 8am – 12 pm on May 3rd, and the AP World History Class will take place from 8am – 12 pm on May 11th. Students will be able to sign up for their respective AP Exams in their AP Classes during the month of February.

April Testing Dates Announced

MME (SAT, WORKKEYS, M-STEP), M-STEP, PSAT, and MI-ACCESS WILL BE GIVEN IN APRIL

The MME (Michigan Merit Exam), M-STEP, MI-ACCESS, and PSAT summative assessments will be given to Blissfield Students this April. The SAT test date is 4/12/23, the WORKKEYS test date is 4/13/23, and Science and Social Studies portion of the M-STEP will be given to high school juniors on 4/17/23 & 4/18/23, while the PSAT 8, 9, 10 will be given to all 8th grade students, freshmen and sophomores during a window that runs from 4/12/23 – 4/18/23.The M-STEP and MI-ACCESS will be given to all students in grades 3 -8 during a window that runs from 4/10/23 through 5/26/23.

Work Based Learning

As next year's class scheduling process gets underway students are reminded that Work Based learning is an attractive option for many students. Work Based learning is open to junior and senior high school students, and it can take place in three formats: Co-Op, Work Experience, and a Custom Class. In each of these options students earn credit, and in both Co-Op and Work Experience the students can earn credit and get paid for their services. Co-Op is in relation to the student's tech center course that they have had experience in, while Work Experience relates to a student's EDP (Educational Development Plan). A Custom Class is a uniquely developed experience that also relates to a student's EDP, and in this case the student is looking to gain more experience in their field, as opposed to getting compensated for their efforts.

There will be a Work Based Learning meeting on March 15th during VIP for all students who are interested.

One important aspect of the program is that all of the student's Work Based Learning Paperwork must be turned in and approved before the start of the 2023-24 school year.

Royal Learners Program Addresses Learning Loss

What prompted the formation of a special after school elementary program? In the fall of 2022, the The Michigan Department of Education (MDE) announced that schools would

have the opportunity to apply for a one-time grant through Section 98c to address learning loss. These funds were made available through Public Act (PA) 144 of 2022, which was signed into law on July 14, 2022, by Governor Gretchen Whitmer.



Who has been tasked with framing the curriculum? Cris Rupp, Blissfield Community Schools Director of Learning Loss, along with Robyn Francis, BCS Director of Literacy and Title Programs, began planning for what would become the Royal Learners After School Program. Significant credit now goes to the teachers involved as they help plan and implement the delivery of curriculum. Our support staff is also integral in implementation.



What led to focusing on 4th - 6th grade students? "In 2020, these students were in 1st, 2nd, and 3rd grades. These are crucial years for developing foundational skills in both reading and math. As a district, our goal is for all of our students to be proficient readers and mathematicians before leaving elementary school." Mr Rupp went on to say that, "COVID made that difficult for a couple of years, and from that, we knew we needed to narrow our focus to address the learning loss by using the 98c funds."

After looking at current benchmark assessment scores and talking with the BCS Administrative Team, it was decided that the focus would be current 4th, 5th and 6th graders and that a twice-weekly after school program would be started to help eliminate gaps in these students' learning.

How have you been able to target specific responses? "Royal Learners is different than a typical homework-help program because we look at what skills each student needs to develop in order to be successful, and we work to fill those gaps," explained Robyn Francis. Students were identified based on their September benchmark assessments. Individual reading and math goals were established based on each student's needs. Student progress toward these goals is monitored on a regular basis to ensure that goals are being met and that foundational skills are improving.

Why have you elected to create small groups? The Royal Learners program utilizes both certified teachers and support staff members and targets individual learning goals in a small-group setting. Studies show that small group targeted interventions, such as those utilized in the Royal Learners program, can have a statistically significant positive impact on students at risk of academic difficulties. The goal of Royal Learners is to help these students gain skills that will allow them to feel more confident and be more successful as they continue their education at BCS.

How long will this year's program run? Around 60 students were invited to participate in Royal Learners, and about 30 students have been attending the after-school program regularly since it began in January 2023. Through the grant, we are able to provide snacks and transportation to students in the program. The Royal Learners program runs through May, and student overall progress will be assessed at that time to gauge the effectiveness of the program and reported to the MDE.
